NASTIEST POLITICAL RACE IN AMERICA?

Until I stepped down from public life a little over a year ago, I was one of the longest serving public officials in Louisiana. I have been a part of the political scene as an elected official for almost 30 years. I've watched a number of political figures come and go, many who took off like shooting stars and then were beaten and burnt out as the years progressed. And there has been no shortage of heavy, negative political ads. Oh, you're right. I've run a number of such ads myself in races for Secretary of State and Insurance Commissioner. A negative ad I ran against challenger Sally Nungusser back in 1995 won a national Classic Telly award as one of the most effective political spots of the past twenty years. But I have never, ever seen anything like what is going on in Louisiana's Third Congressional District.

Personal attacks, rumors, innuendos, distortions, half-truths, even outright lies. And not just occasionally. T.V. spots run continually here in Baton Rouge which is on the fringe of the rambling, half moon-shaped district.

Voters in south Louisiana are telling me the whole campaign is an embarrassment, they don't like what they're seeing, and they want the race brought to an end. Who cares who wins? Just get it over with and let us get back to our normal lives again. Isn't that what the rest of the country is doing? Louisiana continues to be an "aberration" by even having an election in December. Every other congressional race in America has been decided, and newly elected congressmen are already in line picking out their new offices. Bobby Jindal has even been elected president of the incoming newly elected congressional class. So whoever wins in the third and seventh districts is missing out building relationships that could be of great help in the years to come. So their constituents are being shortchanged by the Louisiana system.

The Louisiana legislature has a number of options. Abolish the open primary, at least when it comes to federal elections. This would be a tough thing to do, since voters like to be able to cross over party lines. The governor will have to use some major political capital if such a change is going to come about.

Federal campaign finance laws limit what restrictions can be placed on massive out-of-state money flowing into the state. Someone said: "But it's great that all this out-of-state money is being spent in Louisiana." Hogwash. Ninety percent of the money being spent in the third district race is pouring in from out-of-state. This vested interest money will have a direct effect on who represents Louisiana in Congress. The gold pours in from political organizations nationwide, and voters in Louisiana get the shaft. The legislature can find some creative ways to drastically limit this outside influence. There are some old hands in the Louisiana legislature, particularly long-time Rep. Peppi Bruneau, who could wrap a rope around these various outside groups, and make it extremely difficult to pour this out-of-state cash into party coffers.

Projections? A major drop-off in voter participation. Turnout could be less than 40 percent. This favors the two Republicans. But whatever happens, just get it over with. After all, it's Christmas, and it's going to take a little while to get all of the slime cleaned up. Both parties can, with good reason, be labeled as the "Grinch" this year.
